The University of California, Riverside cares about the health and well-being of all students, staff and faculty in our community. All students have been impacted as a result of the campus moving to a remote instruction environment for the entire spring 2020 quarter. To provide some financial relief during the COVID-19 pandemic, UC Riverside is distributing Emergency Financial Aid Grants to eligible undergraduate and graduate students from the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF), part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act. In the interest of transparency, and to comply with federal reporting requirements, details about our use of these funds is provided below.

The university has received \$14,867,313 from the Department pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students, which was signed on April 10, 2020 and returned to the Department of Education and approved on April 21, 2020 by the U.S. Department of Education. The University of California, Riverside will use no less than 50 percent of the funds received under § 18004(a) (1) of the CARES Act to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.

To receive a CARES Emergency Financial Aid Grant at UC Riverside, students must meet the following criteria:

- Be eligible to participate in programs under § 484 in Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965 which includes but is not limited to:
 - o Must be a U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen
 - Have a valid Social Security Number
 - o Registered for Selective Service (males only), and
 - Have a high school diploma, GED, or completion of high school in an approved homeschool setting, and
- Be active and enrolled on the date the CARES Emergency Grant is awarded

Amongst students who meet the above criteria, the grants are awarded as follows:

In looking at summer enrollments and eligible students, the remaining funds were re-appropriated to undergraduate and graduate students. For undergraduate students the approach is to provide these emergency grants to our neediest student population based on FAFSA data. Similar to awards made during the spring quarter, we identified "Parenting Students" (students with children) with Pell Eligible Expected Family Contribution (EFC) and provided them with a higher amount given the needs of these students. We then identified the remaining Pell Eligible students who enrolled during the summer. Because of the limitation of available funds, CARES Act Emergency grants were offered to undergraduate students who were Pell Grant eligible during the summer term as follows:

The approach for the graduate student population was slightly different than the undergraduate student population. We identified all graduate students enrolled in summer sessions, but excluded MSOL as this is a fully online program and these students don't qualify for CARES Act Emergency Grants. Most students, except for 8 graduate students, submitted a FAFSA. For the 8 students without a FAFASA, they were sent an email requiring to complete the affidavit used for the spring quarter. Here's how the grants were distributed to Graduate students:
